Colossians 1

Background

Collosae was a small town to the east of Ephesus in Asia Minor with a mixed population of Phrygians, Greeks, and Jews. Colossae was an important trade center as it resided at the crossroads of Ephesus in the west to the cities of the east. It was also located about 10 miles from Laodicea. Like many cities in Asia Minor, there was a strong contingent of Gnosticism, paganism, and the worship of false gods and goddesses similar to Diana/Artemis in Ephesus. This letter was the result of faithful Epaphras, a leader in the church of Colossae that ventured to Rome to visit Paul in chains to give him a status of not only Colossae, but also Asia Minor as a whole.

Day 1 - Read and Memorize

- 1. Read the chapter at least twice. If possible, use different translations. Optionally, have the passage read to you. Many apps, including the Blue Letter Bible, have a feature that will read the Bible to you. Meditate and pray on the passage.
- 2. Consider and start memorizing the verse below:

Colossians 1:16

"For by Him all things were created that are in heaven and that are on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or principalities or powers. All things were created through Him and for Him."
