1 Corinthians 10 Worksheet

Read

Please read the verses listed above three times from at least two different translations. It is recommended to use at least one 'word for word' translation (NKJV, NASB, ESV) and at least one 'thought by thought' translation (NLT, NIV, CSB). Meditate and pray on the passage.

Cultural Snapshot/Historical Background

Chapter 10 begins with Paul providing a history lesson to the church of Corinth about the Israelites during the time of the exodus. You can read more about this in Exodus 13 starting in verse 17. This period of history begins from the point that Pharaoh let the children of Israel leave the land of Egypt and details their triumph over the Red Sea and their failings in the wilderness.

How many of the believers in Corinth would be familiar with the crossing of the Red Sea? I'm sure many would be. What about the pervasive idolatry in the wilderness? Paul was trying to weave in this historical account to get the Corinth church to realize their own idolatry. It's a story that comes with some very dire consequences including the killing of many Israelites due to their rampant sin. As a church smack dab in the middle of the "Sin City" of the day where sexual immorality is commonplace, this warning should provoke the church in the right direction.

The goal of interpretation is to discover God's intended meaning for the text we just read and provided observations for. Write down your interpretations in your notebook or the space below. Please note: if you are not comfortable with this portion of the Inductive process, then please do not worry about completing this section. As time goes on it'll become possible and easier for you as this will be discussed in group time.

Application
