Cultural Snapshot/Historical Background

After spending a good portion of his letter to the church of Corinth addressing the church gathering, Paul now shifts his focus to discuss the resurrection for the remainder of the letter. There were some in the church that denied the resurrection and also claimed it wasn't necessary to believe it to be a believer. Thankfully, Paul strongly opposed this false teaching and provided the basis for why the resurrection was so important.

This wonderful letter is getting close to the end. Dive into chapter 15 and find the important truths behind why the resurrection is mandatory for us to even be called Christians.
