## 1 Corinthians 4 Worksheet

### Read

Please read the verses listed above three times from at least two different translations. It is recommended to use at least one 'word for word' translation (NKJV, NASB, ESV) and at least one 'thought by thought' translation (NLT, NIV, CSB). Meditate and pray on the passage.

# **Cultural Snapshot/Historical Background**

Paul is addressing the Corinthians on some key topics that should be fresh in their memory from his visit to them. Paul brings up key topics such as being stewards, examples, sufferers, and correctors. What do we know about Paul and his relationship with the Corinthians at this time? Why would these have more validity coming from Paul to the Corinthians?

Geographically we know that Corinth was a prosperous city that had been rebuilt around a hundred years earlier by Julius Caesar. They had experienced a long period of prosperity. Years before the writing of this letter they had Paul himself there teaching them for a year and a half (Acts 18:11). Think of Corinth as the New York of today. These people were rich, living the life of ease. The last thing they wanted was to give up the leisure and riches of this world and seek eternal riches.

Paul reminds them of the importance of being stewards of Christ. In v8 he points out they had become rich in the flesh. Paul was a servant to them while he was still making his own living by making tents (Acts 18:3). He reminds them in v5 how they are quick to judge but should let God judge. In Acts 18:12-15 they took him to court and were told that this was a matter of God's teaching not man's. Paul is reminding them of this they had already gone through when he was there. In v9-13 he points to the poor treatment one can expect as a follower a Christ. This is the difficult message that the prosperous do not want to hear. Here they were in the most wealth city in the region and Paul is reminding them how he lived when he was there and that they need to seek out the riches of Christ like they seek the riches of the world. He ends up the chapter (v14-16) with the contrast of their inability to follow his example when he is not present, pointing out to them how much more they need to follow Christ the same as He will return with the same expectation.
